



Interview Information



My name is Rosie. I am a Professor of Law at the University of Birmingham.

I want to talk to you about making a will.



Use this information to help you decide if you want to talk to me.

Why do you want to talk to me?



The **Law Commission** has been set up by the Government to look at whether there should be changes to certain laws.

The Law Commission are thinking about changing the law about wills.

Rosie is helping the Law Commission to find out more about the support some disabled people need to make a will.

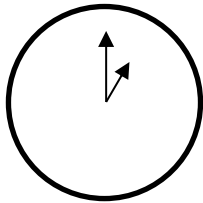
Do I have to talk to you?

No. You can choose.

What will happen if I talk to you?

Rosie will ask you questions about what you think about wills.

You can have somebody you know with you if you want.



The interview will take about one hour.

If you have a lot to say it might take longer.



You need to fill in a consent form before we begin.



If you feel unhappy, tell Rosie and she will stop.



If you tell Rosie that you or somebody else might be in serious danger, she will need to tell someone about it. If this happens, she will talk to you first.



You can stop the interview at any time.

You do not need to give a reason.

After the interview you can tell Rosie you don't want to take part for up to 3 months.



Rosie would like to audio record the interview. This is so she can listen to you properly.

What will happen after the interview?



Rosie will talk about what you tell her to other researchers and people interested in her research.



She will talk about what she finds out with the Law Commission.
The Law Commission will use this to help them decide about the best way to change the law.



Rosie would like to tell people exactly what you said in the interview.
She will make sure nobody can tell that it was you.



Rosie will write about what you tell her.
Other people will read what she writes.

She will send you a report about what she finds out.

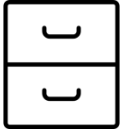


She will put the report on the www.legalcapacity.org.uk website.
